President's Letter

It's hard to believe summer is almost over and schools are already beginning to open around the Commonwealth. As I begin each school year, in my current position overseeing school transportation, I take time to reflect on years past. I often think my career in pupil transportation actually began when I was a 3rd grader riding a bus to and from school about 10 miles each way.

As a result of riding the bus, I was afforded the opportunity for socialization with my peers, and watching the driver shift gears which prepared me for my future driving career. As I look back, the worst part of riding the bus was that I was notorious for losing my homework which resulted in my Mom often getting a call from my teacher. My mom will tell you today that I did my homework but just couldn't seem to keep track of it on the bus! It was my great experiences riding the bus that made me determine at such an early age I wanted to be associated with school buses when I grew up.

After graduating from high school in 1981, I was hired on as one of the youngest ever substitute drivers for Hampton City Schools. I drove many different routes in that capacity. Later I served as a contracted driver, then driver trainer, and finally as a supervisor before leaving Hampton in 1999 for a position as Manager of Transportation Services with York County School Division.

Today, some 35 years after becoming employed in the field of pupil transportation, I serve as the Associate Director of Transportation and Warehouse Operations for the York County Schools. When I think about this, I wonder where the years have gone. Most importantly I am amazed at how our industry accomplishes what it does in such a safe and efficient manner.

Here in the Commonwealth there are approximately 15,500 school buses transporting 861,000 students daily. For the average person, they can't fathom those numbers and what we do every day. Often times for many it appears to be a thankless job. I tell my staff at the end of the day when you have time to reflect, and you think of all the students who have been transported to and from school, on off-campus trips, etc., when all have arrived at their destination safely, that's the true reward for a job well done.

Because of the dedication of all those employed in the school bus industry, school buses are rated as the safest mode of transportation for getting children back and forth to school, by the U. S. Department of Transportation. This is quite an accomplishment everyone in our profession can be proud of.

No matter what your role is in our industry, you play an important one. Never forget the impression you make, on the students we serve, whether it is that of making a positive impact which like in my case, could lead to a future pupil transportation professional or just make a tough day better for a student riding your bus. Never forget the important role that you play in your precious cargo's life while driving that school bus. Thanks for going the extra mile!



Spotlight On...

According to the Campbell County, VA webpage (www.co.campbell.va.us), in 1781 it became incorporated and "is located in Virginia's south central Piedmont region in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains." It was named for General William Campbell, the Revolutionary War hero famous for his leadership. Home to Red Hill—Patrick Henry National Memorial and Avoca Museum, the Staunton River flows through Campbell. This Pupil Transportation Department covers Campbell's 511 square miles and is bordered by Lynchburg to the north and includes the Town of Altavista in the southwest and the Town of Brookneal in the southeast. Campbell is 115 miles from Richmond and has a population of 55,235. Campbell County Public School Division has approximately 8000 students and its Pupil Transportation Department transports nearly 5,500 students on 83 regular routes and 15 Special Needs routes along with 6 vans for special transportation. Dr. Tim Hoden has been the Director of Operations for 7 years now. Their first day of school begins on Monday, August 15th with their projected end date being on Friday, June 2, 2017. According to the school division's website (www.campbell.k12.va.us), their mission is "To provide a world-class education that enables every student to choose and pursue any post K12 endeavor".
