The top of the page bus has SCHOOL BUS – STOP STATE LAW lettered on the front and rear and only one red warning light at the driver's windshield and on the rear above the left turn signal and brake light. Now, take a look at the above one she drives. Only SCHOOL BUS in 8" high letters on the front and rear of bus, 2 amber and 2 red warning lights (front and rear), crossing mirrors, crossing gate, better visibility, especially the service door.

VIRGINIA BEACH SHARES - - -

The Virginia Beach City Public Schools Transportation Department utilizes the following information received from the document school bus drivers submit to the office for reporting violators of the school bus stop law. The completed form is copied upon receipt for our records and forwarded to the Virginia Beach City Police Department for their response.

- Bus #
- Date of incident
- Location of incident
- Time violation occurred (include AM or PM)
- Direction vehicle approached stopped school bus
- Description of the vehicle
- School bus completely stopped?
- Amber warning lights activated the prescribed distance before the pupil stop?

150 feet if posted speed limit is less than 35 mph 300 feet if the posted speed limit is 35 mph or greater

- Stop arm extended and Red, flashing warning lights in operation immediately upon stopping?
- School bus driver sound the horn before the motorists failed to stop?
- Comments
- School Bus driver's signature
- Date violation document was submitted to Transportation
- The school bus driver is responsible for obtaining all information contained on this report.

National Weather Service Hurricane Outlook for 2005

NOAA's 2005 Atlantic hurricane season outlook indicates a 70% chance of an above-normal hurricane season, a 20% chance of a near-normal season, and only a 10% chance of a below-normal season. This outlook is produced by scientists at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Climate Prediction Center (CPC), Hurricane Research Division (HRD), and National Hurricane Center (NHC). See NOAA's definitions of above-, near-, and below-normal seasons.

The outlook calls for 12-15 tropical storms, with 7-9 becoming hurricanes, and 3-5 of these becoming major hurricanes. The likely range of ACE index is 120%-190% of the median. This prediction reflects a very likely continuation of above-normal activity that began in 1995.

The predicted 2005 activity reflects 1) an expected <u>continuation of conditions associated with the tropics-wide multi-decadal signal</u>, which has favored above-normal Atlantic hurricane seasons since 1995, and 2) an expected continuation of <u>warmer sea surface temperatures in the tropical Atlantic Ocean</u> than can be accounted for by the multi-decadal signal alone. The outlook also reflects the expectation of ENSO-neutral conditions (no El Niño or La Niña) during August-October, the peak months of the hurricane season. An updated Atlantic hurricane outlook will be issued in early August.
