A Message from our President, Michael Ashby...



Before children go back to school or start school for the first time, it is essential that adults and children know traffic safety rules. NHTSA is committed to reducing school bus-related crashes, injuries, and fatalities through both behavioral programs and vehicle regulations. SCHOOL BUS DRIVER DAY

Each year, the California State Assembly recognizes the hard and dedicated service provided by California School Bus Drivers. The State of California declares the fourth Tuesday in April as School Bus Driver Day in California.

TIPS ON SAFE DRIVING

- Always wear your seatbelt.
- Expect other drivers to make mistakes and think what you will do if a mistake does happen. For example, do not assume that a vehicle approaching a stop sign or traffic light is going to stop. And you should never assume a motorist is going to stop for your school bus red traffic warning lights and stop arm. Wait until they are stopped before you discharge the children or signal them to cross the street or highway. Always be ready to react if the driver does not stop.
- Always drive with your headlights on. A school bus is visible for nearly 4 times the distance with its headlights on even during daytime hours.
- Keep your eyes moving to notice what is happening all around your bus not only checking the sides of the road but behind you by checking your mirrors every 6-8 seconds.
- In bad weather, if it is necessary to reduce one's speed, the brake should be applied slowly without making sudden moves. When making sudden moves it's much easier to lose control of your school bus. Stopping and turning should be done slowly.
- As you increase your speed you must increase your <u>braking distance</u> and <u>following distance</u>. It is extremely important that you realize the importance of taking into consideration the weight of the school bus you are stopping. You must increase your stopping distance and following distance more when there are passengers aboard the bus due to the added weight! Not only will you have the weight of the bus, but the added weight of the passengers, so keep in mine you will need a greater distance to safely stop the school bus than when the bus is empty.
- Always act and drive like a professional remember you influence the image of Virginia school bus drivers.

WINDSHIELD WIPERS

We are not sure why it is so effective; just try this method when it rains heavily. It is useful...even driving at night.

Most of the motorists would turn on HIGH or FASTEST SPEED of the wipers during heavy downpour, yet the visibility in front of the windshield is still bad. In the event you face such a situation, just try your SUN GLASSES (any model will do). All of a sudden, your visibility in front of your windshield should be perfectly clear, as if there is no rain. Make sure you always have a pair of SUN GLASSES in your car, as you are not only helping yourself to drive safely with good vision, but might save your and someone else's life. Try it yourself. Amazing, you still see the drops on the windshield, but not the sheet of rain falling. You can see where the rain bounces off the road. It works to eliminate the "blindness" from passing semi's spraying you too. Or the "kick-up" if you are following a semi or car in the rain. They ought to teach that little tip in driver's training.

USE OF THE CRUISE CONTROL

A 36 year old female had an accident several weeks ago and totaled her car.

A resident of Kilgore, Texas she was traveling between Gladewater & Kilgore. It was raining, though not excessively, when her car suddenly began to hydro-plane and literally flew through the air. She was not seriously injured but very stunned at the sudden occurrence!

When she explained to the highway patrolman what had happened he told her something that every driver should know - NEVER DRIVE IN THE RAIN WITH YOUR CRUISE CONTROL ON. She thought she was being cautious by setting the cruise control and maintaining a safe consistent speed in the rain. But the highway patrolman told her that if the cruise control is on when your car begins to hydro-plane and your tires lose contact with the pavement, your car will accelerate to a higher rate of speed making you take off like an airplane. She told the patrolman that was exactly what had occurred. The patrolman said this warning should be listed, on the driver's seat sun-visor – NEVER USE THE CRUISE CONTROL WHEN THE PAVEMENT IS WET OR ICY, along with the airbag warning. We tell our teenagers to set the cruise control and drive a safe speed - but we don't tell them to use the cruise control only when the pavement is dry.

The only person the accident victim found, who knew this (besides the patrolman), was a man who had a similar accident, totaled his car and sustained severe injuries.

NOTE: Some vehicles (like the Toyota Sienna Limited XLE) will not let you set the cruise control when the windshield wipers are on.

Down Home Cooking in Alabama



Pot Likker Dumplings:

1 ham hock, turnip greens, 2 tbsp. chopped onion, 2 12 cups cornmeal, ½ tsp. salt, 1 well beaten egg

Put turnip greens and ham hock in big pot and cook gently for about an hour. Season to taste. To make dumplings, combine cornmeal, onion, and salt. Add enough boiling pot likker from the turnip greens to make stiff dough. Cool slightly. Stir in the egg. Shape into small patties about half an inch thick. Lay patties gently on top of simmering greens, cover, and cook 10 to 15 minutes.

Lacy-edged corn cakes:

2 cups corn meal, 1 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. salt, 1 egg, 3 cups buttermilk

Break egg into bowl into which have been sifted together meal, soda, and salt. Add buttermilk, stirring to blend. Batter should be thin. Bake in small cakes on hot, greased griddle. Each cake should have a crisp, lacy edge.

Here are some of the main points to ponder...some may surprise you...but please see the entire presentation....This may serve as a good source of information to share at a driver in-service meeting to help reinforce why drivers of all vehicles need to avoid distractions.

Thanks are extended to Cheryl Fisher in Fauquier County for sharing...

- Distractions now join alcohol and speeding as leading factors in fatal and serious injury crashes.
- Cell phone users are 4 times as likely to crash. 28% of all crashes attributable to cell phones. Hands-free devices offer no safety benefit when driving. Cognitive distraction still exists with hands-free. Multitasking for the brain is a myth. Human brains do not perform two tasks at the same time. Just listening to sentences on cell phones decreased activity by 37% in the brain's parietal lobe which perceives movement, integrates sensory information and also has importance for language processing. We can walk and chew gum safely because it is not a cognitively-demanding task



WHEN BUSTER BYNUM WAS INDUCTED INTO THE "NAPT HALL OF FAME"

R. A. BYNUM, or "Buster" as his family, friends and professional associates throughout the pupil transportation industry know him, has been involved with school transportation since 1956. It's not surprising, then, that it seems like Buster has always been a forceful advocate for school bus safety.

Bynum began his career as the first full-time Supervisor of Pupil Transportation in Mecklenburg County, VA. Buster worked in Mecklenburg County for seven years before he joined the Virginia Department of Education on August 1, 1962 as Pupil Transportation Assistant Supervisor. Mr. Bynum was appointed Program Manager (state director) of Pupil Transportation in 1972 and served in that capacity until he retired nearly 20 years later in September 1991.

In the words of Virginia's then state director, Dr. Barbara Goodman, Bynum "reminds me of a Southern gentlemen - stately in his appearance, gracious in his manner and gentle in nature - until it comes to pupil transportation. Then, he becomes intense on issues he believes are important to pupil transportation and the safety of children." Buster advocated comprehensive driver training, improved railway grade crossing safety, and state of the art equipment specifications long before many of his peers. A classic example of his vision is exemplified in his work to prohibit the purchase of non-conforming vehicles in the late 1980's - more than a decade before the issue received widespread industry attention and support.

Although a variety of pupil transportation organizations have reaped the benefits of Buster's professional expertise, none has been dearer to him than the Southeastern States Pupil Transportation Conference (SESPTC). He has been SESPTC Treasurer since 1988 and, prior to that time, he served as President (1967 and 1987), Vice President (1966 and 1986), Secretary (1974) and Secretary/Treasurer (1985).


Except for several years when state travel was prohibited, Buster has also attended every NAPT conference. In fact, he was instrumental in securing funding and political support for the infant NAPT. After the Rural Education Division of the National Education Association (NEA) decided to forego assistance for the Association, Buster encouraged a variety of sponsors, including the State Directors Association, to join forces and move forward with a plan to strengthen the industry and its various constituencies. When Virginia hosted the NAPT and NASDPTS conferences in Norfolk, Buster was very involved on on-site and program planning as well as serving as a presenter during the NAPT program.
